

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Limitations of Current Data and Information Systems

As you review the information contained in this Sourcebook, it is important to keep in mind that data have been drawn from a number of state level criminal justice data collection systems in an attempt to provide a snapshot of crime trends in the Commonwealth. A detailed description of the existing systems can be found in Appendix A. Until these systems are fully integrated into a statewide Unified Criminal Justice Information System, there will remain limitations in the data available for analysis. These and other limitations are delineated below:

- Data collection systems of criminal justice agencies were established independently for in-house data management purposes and not for planning or policy evaluation.
- There are currently no standardized formats for defining data elements or counting criminal justice events. Agencies vary according to what is being counted (e.g. charges, cases, or individuals).
- Starting in 2005, in an attempt to further unify the data, all data were requested to be reported on a calendar year basis, with the exception of fiscal data. This particular change in the reporting parameters may affect the user's ability to compare data across previous editions of the Sourcebook.
- Several agencies have provided updated data for years prior to 2007. As a result, the data in the 2007 Sourcebook may be different than that which is found in earlier editions of the Sourcebook. Where possible, the updated data has been included in order to provide the most accurate data available. Data updates may occur because of changes in the system, changes to the criminal code, and/or retroactive data updates.
- As a result of the variation across agencies, it is currently not possible to publish a fully integrated criminal justice system report or to perform systemic trend analyses. This report is intended to provide individual snapshots of the key components of the justice system (law enforcement, courts, corrections, prosecution, and defense), and to draw general conclusions regarding system trends where possible.
- In 2007, the U.S. Department of Justice estimated that 46% of all violent victimizations and 37% of all property crimes were reported to the police. In order to provide a better picture of the actual levels of victimization that are occurring within the Commonwealth, the Justice and Public Safety Cabinet conducted a crime victimization study in conjunction with the Statistical Analysis Center in the spring of 2008. This study helps to provide a better picture of the actual levels of victimization that are occurring within the Commonwealth. - Variations in definitions may result in considerable inconsistencies in numbers across agencies. The data may be used to determine whether trends are consistent across agencies, however, individual numbers may differ significantly. This report is expected to improve over time as reporting practices become more consistent.
- Kentucky currently uses the FBI's Summary Uniform Crime Reporting Program (UCR) to collect data. The UCR is a nationwide, cooperative statistical effort of more than 17,700 city, county, college and university, state, tribal and federal agencies voluntarily reporting data on crimes. These agencies represent 94.6% of the Nation's population. The UCR includes information on Part I offenses which include the violent crimes of murder and non-negligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault and the property crimes of burglary, larceny-theft,



motor vehicle theft, and arson. In response to the need for improved statistics, the UCR program has been redesigned into the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS). NIBRS captures up to 56 data elements via six types of data segments: administrative, offense, victim, property, offender, and arrestee. As more contributing law enforcement agencies become educated about the data available through incident-based reporting and as resources permit, more agencies are implementing NIBRS reporting. Kentucky is in the transition phase from Summary UCR to NIBRS. NIBRS reporting is already taking place in selected law enforcement agencies. As more agencies become technologically able to submit incident based information, Kentucky crime data will become more complete, thus greatly enhancing query capabilities. Future editions of the Sourcebook will reflect the NIBRS migration with updated charts and data elements.

- Due to severe weather-related computer problems experienced in 1996, Kentucky State Police (KSP) was unable to produce arrest information for the 1996 through 2001 *Crime in Kentucky* publications. The Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) cooperated with the agency by providing arrest data from their court records. This should be taken into consideration when working with KSP arrest data from 1996 through 2001. Starting in 2002, the arrest data are compiled strictly from the citations and summary reports submitted to KSP, thus providing more accurate crime statistics.
- In an effort to improve the quality of the Kentucky State Police's annual *Crime in Kentucky* reports, several adaptations were made in 1998 to data reporting that have continued through 2007. These changes are in accordance with UCR guidelines and will affect the user's ability to compare data published in the 1998 through 2007 reports with previously published data.

Executive Summary

As part of its role in statewide criminal justice planning, the Kentucky Justice and Public Safety Cabinet is charged with the dissemination of information on criminal justice issues and crime trends. This report reflects the Cabinet's sixth initiative to provide state officials with comprehensive information from all components of the criminal justice system to permit improved analysis of criminal justice issues and to help guide decision-making and promote effective policy development.

In the pages that follow, readers will find a description of Kentucky's changing demographics; data from agencies providing services to victims; data on Part I offenses from the perspective of the courts, corrections, and juvenile justice system; highlights on selected crime categories such as drug offenses, sex offenses, and school safety; and key criminal justice cost information.

Kentucky's Changing Demographic Realities

- In 2007, the state's population was 4,241,474, 51% females and 49% males. The median age was 37.4 years. Approximately 24% of the population were under 18 and 13% were older than 65.
- In 2007, Kentucky's 5.5% unemployment rate ranked the state 45th in the nation, with a rate 0.9% higher than the national average of 4.6%.
- In 2007, Kentucky's Gross Domestic Product (GDP) increased to a record \$154 billion, an increase of \$42 billion since 2000. Kentucky's average per capita personal income in 2006 was \$31,111, earning the state a rank of 46th in the U.S. The national average was \$38,611.
- According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the number of Kentuckians living in poverty in 2007 declined to approximately 653,000 persons, or 15.5% of the total population. This is a 0.9% lower than Kentucky's poverty rate in 2006 but 3.0% higher than the national poverty estimate. Among the states, New Hampshire had the lowest estimated poverty rate at 5.8% and Mississippi had the highest at 22.6%. Kentucky had the sixth highest poverty rate in the nation.

Victim Services

- According to data provided by the Department of Corrections' V.I.N.E program, of the 1,149,170 searches for offenders through the V.I.N.E. program in 2007, 44% were conducted via telephone and 56% were conducted via VINELink. In 2007, V.I.N.E. reported a total of 419,240 victim information and registration calls into the call center and 412,211 notification calls issued by the call center. There were a total of 28,865 new V.I.N.E. registrations this same year.
- The Crime Victim Compensation Board granted awards to 2,107 applicants in fiscal year 2007, resulting in \$2,141,210.16 being distributed to victims of violent crime.
- The Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services (CHFS) houses several programs that serve victims of crime including rape crisis centers, domestic violence shelters, and children's advocacy centers. In FY 2007, Kentucky's rape crisis centers provided services to 4,934 victims. The number of crisis calls to the centers decreased from 8,042 in FY 2006 to 5,974 in 2007. Domestic violence shelters in the Commonwealth served 4,209 residents in FY 2007. Domestic violence shelters served an additional 23,453 non-residential clients. Children's advocacy centers served 4,399 child victims in FY 2007, up from 4,179 child victims in FY 2006.
- In 2007, the Kentucky Parole Board conducted 243 victim hearings.



- The Office of the Attorney General's Office of Victims Advocacy provided resource or referral assistance to 49,502 people over the course of 2006 and 2007. The Office of the Attorney General's Child Support Enforcement Commission received 1,800 requests for information or assistance in cases involving child support in 2006 and 2007. A total of 2,900 families were assisted by the Commission. In 2007, the Kentucky Bureau of Investigations received a total of 2,622 complaints for review. A total of 64 cases were opened, 97 cases were closed, and 204 were pending.

Reported Crime Trends

- According to the Kentucky State Police's annual *Crime in Kentucky* reports, the Part I offense rate rose 2.0% between 2005 and 2007. The violent offense rate rose each consecutive year between 2005 and 2007. The property offense rate rose slightly between 2005 and 2006, but decreased 1% between 2006 and 2007.
- Between 2006 and 2007, the offense rate declined for larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson. During this same period, the offense rate rose for murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, and burglary.
- In 2007, with the exception of Virginia, Kentucky had the lowest Part I offense rate among the surrounding states of Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, Ohio, Tennessee, and West Virginia. Between 2005 and 2007, however, Kentucky was the only one of the previously listed states that saw an increase in its Part I Offense rate.
- Jefferson, Mason, and Fulton counties had the highest Part I offense rates in 2007. Green, Carlisle, and Henderson counties had the lowest Part I offense rates. Of cities with a population greater than 10,000, Newport, Ashland, Covington, Louisville, and Bowling Green had the highest Part I offense rates in 2007.

Arrest Trends

- The Kentucky State Police and the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Uniform Crime Reports provided data on arrests. Between 2005 and 2007, the adult arrest rate for all Part I offenses increased 25.8%. In 2007, the arrest rate in Kentucky was higher than national arrest rates for every Part I offense with the exception of arrests for aggravated assault. In fact, arrest rates for murder, rape, burglary, and arson in Kentucky were more than twice the national average.
- In terms of raw numbers, the majority of suspects arrested in 2007 were white. However, while whites comprised almost 90% of Kentucky's population in 2007, only 76% of arrested suspects were white. Compared to the proportion of the population which they comprise, non-whites are over-represented in arrests where the race of the suspect is known. In 2007, 32% of arrestees were women. The offense with the largest percentage of women arrested was larceny-theft; 44% of arrestees were women.

Bail Release Trends

- According to the Administrative Office of the Courts, in 2007, 57% of all Part I offense cases in Circuit Court and 69% of all Part I offense cases in District Court resulted in no bail type. From 2003 to 2007, the majority of Part I offense cases in both courts resulted in no bail type. From 2003 to 2007, the least common types of bail release of all Part I offenses were federally cut, guaranteed arrest bond certificate, no bail set (defendant may not post bond), and released according to KRS 222.204.



Court Disposition and Sentencing Trends

- In 2007, the Part I offense with the highest rate of conviction in Circuit Court was auto theft (65%). The lowest rate of conviction was for murder/homicide (31%) and rape (33%).
- Between 2003 and 2007, an average of 52% of Part I offense cases in Circuit Court resulted in conviction, an average of 24% of cases resulted in an acquittal or dismissal, and an average of 16% of cases were amended. During that same five year period, an average of 45% of Part I offense cases in District Court resulted in conviction and an average of 30% of cases resulted in an acquittal or dismissal.
- In Circuit Court, each year from 2003 to 2007, prison was the most common sentence for all Part I offenses. In 2007, 60% of cases resulted in a sentence of prison, 26% state probation, and 13% jail. In District Court, each year from 2003 to 2007, jail was the most common sentence for all Part I offenses. In 2007, 91% of cases resulted in a sentence of jail, 6% other, and 3% local probation.

Trial Court Caseload Trends

- According to the Administrative Office of the Courts, the number of cases disposed in Circuit Court varies greatly by circuit. In 2007, the number of cases disposed ranged from a high of 4,662 in the 30th Judicial Circuit (Jefferson County) to a low of 158 in the 36th Judicial Circuit (Knott and Magoffin Counties). The number of cases disposed in District Court varies greatly by district. In 2007, the number of cases disposed ranged from a high of 137,680 in the 30th Judicial District (Jefferson County) to a low of 2,040 in the 59th Judicial District (Ballard and Carlisle Counties).
- Figures provided by the Department of Public Advocacy indicate that in 2007, 96% (137,874 cases) of the Department of Public Advocacy's caseload was handled by the Trial Division. Of these cases, 78% were heard in District Court. The workload of the Department of Public Advocacy Field Offices has increased 30% from FY 2003 (112,610 cases) to FY 2007 (146,082 cases).

Appellate Court Caseload Trends

- According to the Administrative Office of the Courts, over the past five years, the Court of Appeals' total number of filings, dispositions, and opinions has remained relatively stable. From 2003 to 2007, over 50% of the cases disposed in the Court of Appeals have consistently been civil appeals.
- The number of cases disposed in the Supreme Court increased each year between 2003 and 2005 but decreased in both 2006 and 2007. Between 2003 and 2007, the total number of disposed cases fell 20%. In 2007, over 90% of cases disposed in the Supreme Court were either motions for discretionary review or direct appeals/original actions.

Commitment and Release Trends

- The Department of Corrections reports that during the five year period from 2003 to 2007, the number of prisoners admitted decreased from a high of 4,573 in 2003 to a low of 2,880 in 2007.
- In 2007, 91% of prison admissions were returned parole violators.



- The prison population in 2007 was 92% male and 8% female. The number of female prisoners increased 57% from 2003 to 2007.
- In 2007, the prison population was 67% white, 32% black, 1% Hispanic, and 0.4% other.
- Prisoners are fairly evenly distributed in terms of age. There are more prisoners in the age group of 26 to 30 (19%) than in any other age group.
- Between 2006 and 2007, the number of new commitments for all Part I offenses remained relatively stable. The offenses with the largest percent decrease in new commitments between 2006 and 2007 were burglary (decreased 32%) and murder (decreased 27%). The offenses with the largest percent increase in new commitments between 2006 and 2007 were rape (increased 61%) and larceny/theft (increased 26%).
- According to the Kentucky Parole Board, the percentage of inmates deferred increased between 2003 and 2007. The percentage of inmates serving out their sentence increased between 2003 and 2004, decreased in 2005 and 2006, and increased again in 2007.

Juvenile Justice System Trends

- The Kentucky State Police reported that between 2006 and 2007, the juvenile arrest rate declined for all Part I offenses with the exception of rape (increased 28.4%) and larceny/theft (increased 11.4%). Overall, the juvenile arrest rate for all Part I offenses declined 1.4%. In 2007, compared to national juvenile arrest rates for Part I offenses, Kentucky's juvenile arrest rates were lower for murder, aggravated assault, robbery, larceny/theft, auto theft, and arson but higher for rape and burglary.
- The Department of Juvenile Justice reported that the total number of committed and probated juveniles in 2007 was 1,268. The majority of these juveniles (79%) were charged with either burglary or larceny-theft. In 2007, the average length of stay for juveniles adjudicated for aggravated assault (218 days) was higher than the average length of stay for any other Part I offense. The shortest average length of stay was for juveniles adjudicated for arson (126 days).
- According to the Department of Juvenile Justice, after remaining relatively stable between 2003 and 2005, the total number of youth served by the juvenile justice system increased to 2,977 in 2006, and then decreased in 2007 to 2,267. More youth served by the juvenile justice system were placed in the home under the supervision of a parent or guardian between 2003 and 2007 than in any other type of placement.
- According to the Administrative Office of the Courts, in 2007, Jefferson County had the highest number of complaints processed by the Court Designated Worker (CDW) program (7,582) and Edmonson County had the lowest (18). The majority of complaints processed by the CDW program involved juveniles charged with assault, theft, or burglary. In 2007, 27% of complaints filed with the CDW program resulted in a successful diversion.

Selected Crime Categories and Crime Indicators

Drug Related Offenses

- The Kentucky State Police reported that the total number of arrests for drug offenses increased 29.8% between 2005 and 2007. During this period, the most significant increase in the number of drug arrests involved arrests for "Other Dangerous Non-Narcotic Drugs" (38.1%). The arrest rate for drug offenses varies significantly across jurisdictions. In 2007, there were no drug arrests in



Robertson County. The highest rate of drug arrests was in Todd County, which had 34.1 arrests per 1,000 persons.

Methamphetamine Related Offenses

- Data provided by the Kentucky State Police indicate that the largest number of methamphetamine related offenses and arrests were associated with manufacturing. The total number of methamphetamine arrests decreased significantly between 2006 and 2007, falling from 1,223 arrests in 2006 to 690 arrests in 2007.
- According to the Administrative Office of the Courts, after reaching a five year high of 5,872 cases in 2005, the total number of cases involving methamphetamine offenses decreased to 4,100 in 2006 and then decreased again to 3,795 in 2007. In 2007, 29% of methamphetamine cases resulted in a conviction and 19% resulted in an acquittal or dismissal.
- After increasing each year between 2003 and 2005, the number of new commitments to the Department of Corrections for methamphetamine offenses fell in 2006 to 298 but then rose to 329 in 2007.

Prescription Drugs

- According to the Kentucky State Police, the largest number of prescription drug related offenses and arrests were related to possession.
- The Administrative Office of the Courts reported that in 2007, the number of prescription drug related cases reached a five-year high of 7,136 cases. In 2007, 36% of prescription drug related cases resulted in a conviction. The percent of prescription drug related cases resulting in conviction has remained relatively stable over the five year period between 2003 and 2007.
- Data from the Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER) system indicate that in 2007, Owsley County had the highest rate of prescriptions dispensed for all controlled substances (4744.2 prescriptions dispensed per 1,000 population). Russell County had the lowest rate (1015.9 prescriptions dispensed per 1,000 population). Of the 120 counties in Kentucky, 118 counties saw an increase in the rate of prescriptions dispensed for all controlled substances between 2005 and 2007.

Driving Under the Influence (DUI) Offenses

- Data provided by the Kentucky State Police reveal that in 2007, Carroll, Gallatin, and Fulton Counties had the highest DUI arrest rates in the state, all with over 20.0 arrests per 1,000 population. Estill, Fleming, Hickman, and Scott Counties had the lowest DUI arrest rates in the state, with less than 3.0 arrests per 1,000 population. Statewide, the total number of adult DUI arrests increased each consecutive year between 2004 and 2007. The adult arrest rate increased 43% between 2003 and 2007 and the juvenile arrest rate fell 29% between 2003 and 2007.
- The Administrative Office of the Courts reported that between 2003 and 2007, the DUI caseload in Lee County almost doubled, making it the county with the largest percent increase over this five year period. With only 11 cases in 2007, Robertson County had the fewest DUI cases compared to any other county. Jefferson County had the most DUI cases with a total of 5,504 cases in 2007. In 2007, 68% of all DUI cases resulted in a conviction.



Sex Offenses

- Data from the Kentucky State Police indicate that the number of forcible rapes in Kentucky rose 6.7% between 2005 and 2007. The forcible rape rate in Kentucky was lower than the national rate in 2005 and 2006 but higher than the national rate in 2007. In 2007, Ohio and Tennessee had higher rates of forcible rape than Kentucky while Illinois, Indiana, Missouri, Virginia, and West Virginia had lower rates of forcible rape.
- According to the Administrative Office of the Courts, the total number of rape, sodomy, and sexual abuse cases declined between 2005 and 2007. Of all sex offense cases, those involving sexual abuse had the highest percentage resulting in conviction.
- The total number of sex offenders newly committed to the Department of Corrections increased from 454 offenders in 2006 to 499 offenders in 2007. The number of sex offenders serving out their sentence more than doubled between 2004 and 2006 but then fell to a five year low of 88 in 2007.

School Safety

- For the 2006-2007 school year, the Kentucky Center for School Safety (KCSS) published its eighth annual report on school safety. The report confirmed that many of the efforts to reduce school crime had indeed been successful.
- Of Kentucky's total 2006-2007 public school population (637,457 students), 7.51% of students committed an offense that resulted in suspension, corporal punishment, or expulsion (with or without services).
- Despite the fact that disciplinary actions for both Part I law violations and Part II law violations increased between the 2005-2006 school year and 2006-2007 school year (increase of 16% and 11% respectively), the number of disciplinary actions for both Part I Law violations and Part II Law violations in the 2006-2007 school year still remains significantly lower than the number of disciplinary actions in the 2003-2004 school year.
- Compared to the 2005-2006 school year, the number of reported law violations increased for robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, and arson in the 2006-2007 school year. The number of larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft offenses decreased. There were no reported homicide or rape offenses during either school year.
- Drug abuse violations accounted for the largest number of Part II law violations during the last three school years. The total number of possession, use, and distribution violations fell each consecutive year between the 2004-2005 school year and the 2006-2007 school year. Although drug violations decreased for most types of substances between the 2004-2005 school year and the 2006-2007 school year, the number of possession and use violations for cocaine/crack and prescription drugs increased and the number of distribution violations for prescription drug violations increased.
- Region 3, Jefferson County, had the highest rate of disciplinary actions for law violations with a rate of 1.57 disciplinary actions per 100 students. Region 2, Southwest, had the lowest rate with .35 disciplinary actions per 100 students.



Key Criminal Justice Cost Information

- In FY 2007, Kentucky's criminal justice agencies' enacted budgets totaled \$1,061,764,100.00
- According to the Department of Corrections, the cost per inmate per day in Kentucky's correctional institutions varies by level of security, from \$35.30 (Marion Adjustment Center) to \$72.82 (Kentucky State Reformatory). The total institutional average is \$50.99 per day.
- According to the Department of Juvenile Justice, in FY 2007, the total annual costs for juvenile institutions, including detention centers, youth development centers, and group homes, was \$55,983,334.00.



Section I: Kentucky's Changing Demographic Realities

Population Realities

In 2007, Kentucky's population was 4,241,474, 51% females and 49% males. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, in 2007, Kentucky ranked 20th in the nation in terms of the median age of its population, which was 37.4 years. In comparison, that same year, the median age in the U.S. was 36.6. Approximately 24% of the state's population were under 18 and 13% were older than 65. The U.S. Census Bureau projects that the world population will grow 55% between 2000 and 2050. It is important to note, however, that it is projected that only 10% of that growth will be of persons under the age of 25, while 65% will be of persons age 45 and older (Crouch, 2007). In 2007, Kentucky ranked 24th in the nation for its proportion of residents age 65 and over.

Economic Realities

In 2007, Kentucky's Gross Domestic Product (GDP) was \$154 billion, an increase of \$42 billion since 2000. The potential for economic growth continues to improve as Kentucky develops its ability to draw in new industry. Jefferson, Fayette, Boone, and Kenton Counties accounted for 45% of Kentucky's total GDP in 2007 (Carlton, 2008). According to *Kentucky's Business Climate*, a publication of the Kentucky Cabinet for Economic Development, Kentucky is ranked as having the thirteenth lowest overall business costs in the nation. The cost of doing business in Kentucky is actually 8% lower than the national average. In addition, Kentucky has the 4th lowest overall cost of doing business in the eastern United States.

Manufacturing continues to be the state's largest industrial sector; however, the percentage of Kentucky's economy attributed to this sector has declined over the past few years. While manufacturing accounted for 28% of Kentucky's GDP in 1997, by 2006, this percentage had fallen to 18.7% (Carlton, 2008). Kentucky's exports have increased significantly during recent years, further securing the state's influence in the global economy. Kentucky's export shipments of merchandise was \$19.7 billion in 2007, up 83% since 2003. In 2007, Kentucky exported to 194 foreign destinations with its largest market being Canada. The state's leading export category in 2007 was transportation equipment. According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Kentucky's top 5 agricultural exports were tobacco, live animals and meat, feed grains and products, soybeans and products, and poultry and products. In 2007, Kentucky ranked 21st in the nation in the export of all agricultural goods but 2nd specifically in the export of tobacco.

After reaching an exceptional low in 2000, Kentucky's unemployment rate began to rise, peaking in July of 2003 at 6.5%. In 2007, Kentucky ranked 45th in the nation with an unemployment rate of 5.5%, which was 0.9% higher than the nation average of 4.6%. According to the Kentucky Education and Workforce Development Cabinet (2008), Kentucky's average per capita personal income in 2007 was \$31,111, earning the state a rank of 46th in the U.S. Only Mississippi, West Virginia, Arkansas, and South Carolina had lower per capita incomes than Kentucky in 2007. The national per capita personal income in 2007 was \$38,611. In 2006, Woodford County had the highest per capita income in the state, \$42,638, followed by Jefferson County with \$39,877. Jackson County had the lowest per capita income in the state, \$16,034, followed closely by Elliott County, \$16,439.

In 2007, the three major occupational categories employing the highest number of workers consisted of office and administrative support, production, and sales (Kentucky Education and Workforce Development Cabinet, 2008). Today, most available jobs require education and/or training beyond high school. Education is highly valued in a knowledge economy and it is this awareness that has fueled



Kentucky to prioritize the pursuit of higher education. Recent initiatives to promote education are paying off and the number of postsecondary degrees awarded in Kentucky has risen considerably. In the last decade, enrollment in Kentucky's state-supported post-secondary institutions has increased from over 158,000 in 1998 to nearly 213,000 in 2007. The vast majority of that growth can be attributed to the Kentucky Community and Technical College System (KCTCS), which has seen an 80% increase in enrollment in the last ten years (Watterson, 2008). Over this same period of time, the number of Bachelor degrees awarded has increased 29% and the number of Associate's degrees awarded has increased 57%. Despite this progress, the percentage of Kentuckians with a bachelor's degree or higher (20.0%) in 2006 was still well below the national average (27.0%). In 2006, the percentage of adults over the age of 25 with a high school degree or higher (including a GED) was 79.6%, which earned the state the rank of 49th in the nation.

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the number of Kentuckians living in poverty in 2007 declined to approximately 653,000 persons, or 15.5% of the total population. This is a 0.9 decrease in the poverty rate from 2006, and 3.0% higher than the national poverty estimate of 12.5%. Nationwide, 37.3 million people were in poverty, up from 36.5 million in 2006. Among the states, New Hampshire had the lowest estimated poverty rate at 5.8%, Mississippi the highest at 22.6%. Kentucky had the sixth highest poverty rate in the nation. According to data collected in 2005, Kentucky ranks 7th in the nation in terms of the percentage of its population (19%) receiving social security benefits. Twenty-five percent of social security beneficiaries in Kentucky are receiving disability payments, the second highest percentage in the nation (Economic Policy Institute, 2005).

Geographic Realities

With land spanning 39,732 square miles, Kentucky ranks 37th in land area among the U.S. states. Covering 12.7 million acres, the state's commercial forest land covers 50% of Kentucky's land area. According to the USDA, the state is ranked 4th in the nation, behind only Texas, Missouri, and Iowa, in terms of its number of farms (83,000). With the exception of Alaska, Kentucky has more miles of running water than any other state.

The state experienced significant population growth during the 1990's in the state's metropolitan areas, metropolitan fringe areas, and along interstate corridors. Population shifts also occurred as a result of migration both into and out of the state. Migration is currently one of the key indicators of population growth rates in Kentucky. During the period from 2000-2005 population growth from domestic migration (44,188 persons) was greater than from international migration (30,889 persons) (Price, Scobee, & Sawyer, 2004). In terms of domestic migration, out-migration of persons with a college education and persons in professional or highly technical jobs was greater than in-migration of similarly classified persons. Even though non-whites still make up a fairly small portion of Kentucky's population, migration has accelerated the growth of minority populations. Between 1990 and 2000, the state's Hispanic population grew 172.6%. The 2006 American Community Survey estimates Kentucky's Hispanic population at 85,938, an increase of 43.3% since 2006. Many believe that this figure would likely be significantly larger if the number of undocumented immigrants living in the state could be accounted for (Crouch, 2007).

It is important to acknowledge that Kentucky's changing demographic realities have an impact on the criminal justice system. For example, as the population ages and the number of mature and aging adults outweighs the number of teens and young adults, changes in the criminal justice system are expected. If the population of inmates in jails and prisons reflects the transformation of the demographic profile of the state and nation, there may be an increase in medical expenditures in jails and prisons as a growing portion of their population will be older.




In order to create effective policy, the positive and negative trends that affect the state must be acknowledged. Kentucky's changing demographic realities require us to understand and address the impact such realities have on the criminal justice system. As readers analyze the criminal justice statistics presented in the 2007 edition of the *Sourcebook of Criminal Justice Statistics in the Commonwealth*, it is helpful to consider them within the context of the demographic realities of the state.

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
Figure 1.a: Projected Population by Age, 2000-2030

Section II: Victim Services

Kentucky has established many successful programs to provide services and aid to victims of crime. Providing services to victims of crime is an important element of the criminal justice system. Data selected for this section were provided by V.I.N.E., the Crime Victims Compensation Board, the Cabinet for Health and Family Services, the Kentucky Parole Board, and the Office of the Attorney General.



V.I.N.E.

The Office of Victim Services is the arm of the Department of Corrections that provides victims with an automatic notification system to alert them about a change in the custody status of their offender. The system is known as Victim Information and Notification Everyday (V.I.N.E.).

The nation's first automated victim notification system was created in Jefferson County, Kentucky, in December 1994. Like many progressive acts, a tragedy was the impetus for the establishment of the V.I.N.E. system. In 1993, Mary Byron was murdered by her estranged boyfriend after he was released from the Jefferson County Jail. Byron was not notified of his release. Byron's parents, Pat and John Byron, led a crusade to ensure that their daughter's death would not be in vain. As a result of their efforts, software engineers developed the V.I.N.E. system and implemented it at the Jefferson County Jail. In 1996, Kentucky again led the way, becoming the first state in the nation to provide victim notification on a statewide basis. Today, more than 2,100 communities nationwide have implemented the V.I.N.E. system. More than two-thirds of the states have established statewide notification through V.I.N.E. The federal government also offers a victim notification service. Nationally, V.I.N.E. generates approximately 700,000 notification calls each month.

The V.I.N.E. system receives booking and release data from all county jails and Department of Corrections institutions. Victims can obtain information about an offender's location, custody status, sentence expiration date, and scheduled parole hearing date. The victim can also register to be notified of changes in an offender's custody status. Information can be obtained by calling a toll free number, by calling the Office of Victim Services, via email, or via the Internet through VINELink. The service is available 24 hours a day. Whenever possible the system provides notification of an offender's release 72 hours prior to the release. In order to ensure that victims receive notification in a timely manner, V.I.N.E. will call the registered telephone number every 30 minutes during a 24 hour time period or until the call is acknowledged by the registered person.

The following information was obtained from the Office of Victim Services in the Department of Corrections:

- Of the 1,149,170 searches for offenders through the V.I.N.E. program, 44% were conducted via telephone and 56% were conducted via VINELink.
- In 2007, V.I.N.E. reported a total of 419,240 victim information and registration calls into the call center and 412,211 notification calls issued by the call center.
- There were a total of 28,865 new V.I.N.E. registrations in 2007.

Crime Victims Compensation Board

Legislation establishing the Crime Victims Compensation Board (CVCB) was enacted in 1974. The office opened in 1978 with the purpose of compensating victims for whom violent crime has resulted in financial hardship due to physical and psychological injury or death. Applicants may receive awards of up to \$25,000 for medical services, hospital expenses, funeral expenses, counseling, loss of wages, and/or benefits for the dependents of a victim who is deceased. The board operates under Kentucky Revised Statute (KRS) 346 and Kentucky Administrative Regulations (KAR) Title 107. The role of the board is to determine eligibility and amount of reimbursement to crime victims.

The following information was received from the Crime Victims Compensation Board.

- The CVCB granted awards to 2,107 applicants in fiscal year 2007, resulting in \$2.1 million being distributed to victims of violent crime.
- Awards were most commonly made for sexual assault related expenses; the least common expense for which an award was granted was attorney fees.

Other Victim Services

The Kentucky Cabinet for Health and Family Services (CHFS), the Kentucky Parole Board, and the Office of the Attorney General also provide services to victims. CHFS houses several programs that serve victims of crime including rape crisis centers, domestic violence shelters, and children's advocacy centers. The data provided by CHFS detail the types of services provided through these programs and the number of victims served. The Kentucky Parole Board provided the number of victim hearings held each month in 2007. The Office of the Attorney General provided numerous data that details the work the office does to protect the Commonwealth and advocate for victims.

- In FY 2007, Kentucky's rape crisis centers provided services to 4,934 victims. That same year, the centers provided education services to 186,301 participants. The centers logged 224,919 volunteer hours in FY 2007, up from 193,090 hours in FY 2006. The number of crisis calls decreased from 8,042 in FY 2006 to 5,974 in 2007.
- Domestic violence shelters in the Commonwealth served 4,209 residents in FY 2007. Domestic violence shelters served an additional 23,453 non-residential clients.
- Children's advocacy centers served 4,399 child victims in FY 2007, up from 4,179 child victims in FY 2006. The centers provided 1,293 medical exams and 2,168 forensic interviews in FY 2007.
- In 2007, the Kentucky Parole Board conducted 243 victim hearings.
- The Office of the Attorney General's Office of Victims Advocacy provided resource or referral assistance to 49,502 people over the course of 2006 and 2007.
- In 2006 and 2007, the Office of the Attorney General's Identity Theft Hotline received 590 complaints of identity theft. A total of 10 investigations were opened.
- The Office of the Attorney General's Child Support Enforcement Commission received 1,800 requests for information or assistance in cases involving child support in 2006 and 2007. A total of 2,900 families were assisted by the Commission.
- In 2007, the Kentucky Bureau of Investigations received a total of 2,622 complaints for review. A total of 64 cases were opened, 97 cases were closed, and 204 were pending.

Section III: Reported Crime Trends

In reviewing data on crime trends, it is important to note the type of data being presented along with the inherent limitations of that data. For example, although law enforcement agencies collect and maintain information on both arrests and offenses reported to the police, researchers generally agree that reported offenses provide a better measure of crime since these reports usually occur closer in time to the actual incidents. While arrests also provide a measure of law enforcement activity, arrests may not be made in all cases and arrests may also reflect specialized enforcement efforts rather than an actual increase in the incidence of crime. Information on Part I offense trends are provided in the following section. The data on Part I offenses are presented for calendar years 2005-2007, as reported to the Kentucky State Police.

- The Part I offense rate rose 2.0% between 2005 and 2007.
- The violent offense rate rose each consecutive year between 2005 and 2007. The property offense rate rose slightly between 2005 and 2006, but decreased 1% between 2006 and 2007.
- Between 2006 and 2007, the offense rate declined for larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson. During this same period, the offense rate rose for murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, and burglary.
- Between 2005 and 2007, the most significant increase in the offense rate for a Part I Offense was for aggravated assault, which rose 14.5% during this two-year period.
- The offense rate for murder increased 14.6% between 2006 and 2007
- Between 2005 and 2007, the offense rate for arson decreased 11.6%. This represented the most significant decrease in the offense rate for a Part I offense during this two-year period.
- In 2007, with the exception of Virginia, Kentucky had the lowest Part I offense rate among the surrounding states of Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, Ohio, Tennessee, and West Virginia. Between 2005 and 2007, however, Kentucky was the only one of the previously listed states that saw an increase in its Part I Offense rate.
- Jefferson, Mason, and Fulton counties had the highest Part I offense rates in 2007. Green, Carlisle, and Henderson counties had the lowest Part I offense rates.
- Of cities with a population greater than 10,000, Newport, Ashland, Covington, Louisville, and Bowling Green had the highest Part I offense rates in 2007.



Section IV: Arrest Trends

This section presents information on arrest trends in the Commonwealth as compiled by the Kentucky State Police.

- The adult arrest rate for all Part I offenses increased 25.8% between 2005 and 2007.
- In 2007, the arrest rate in Kentucky was higher than the national arrest rate for every Part I offense with the exception of arrests for aggravated assault. In fact, arrest rates for murder, rape, burglary, and arson in Kentucky were more than twice the national average.
- In terms of raw numbers, the majority of suspects arrested in 2007 were white. However, while whites comprised almost 90% of Kentucky's population in 2007, only 76% of arrested suspects were white. Compared to the proportion of the population which they comprise, non-whites are over-represented in arrests where the race of the suspect is known.
- In 2007, 32% of arrestees were women. The offense with the largest percentage of women arrested (44%) was larceny-theft.





Section V: Bail Release Trends

This section presents data about the types of bail release used in the Commonwealth. The information reported in this section pertains only to cases in which pre-trial release was granted by the court.

- In 2007, 57% of all Part I offense cases in Circuit Court and 69% of all Part I offense cases in District Court resulted in no bail type. From 2003 to 2007, the majority of Part I offense cases in both courts resulted in no bail type.
- In Circuit Court, the second most common type of bail release in 2007 was partially secured (12%) followed by cash (10%).
- In District Court, the second most common type of bail release in 2007 was cash (11%) followed by partially secured (8%).
- From 2003 to 2007, the least common types of bail release of all Part I offenses were federally cut, guaranteed arrest bond certificate, no bail set (defendant may not post bond), and released according to KRS 222.204.

Section VI: Court Disposition and Sentencing Trends

This section presents information from the Administrative Office of the Courts on case dispositions and sentencing trends for Part I offenses.

- In 2007, the Part I offense with the highest rate of conviction in Circuit Court was auto theft (65%). The lowest rate of conviction was for murder/homicide (31%) and rape (33%).
- Between 2003 and 2007, an average of 52% of Part I offense cases in Circuit Court resulted in conviction, an average of 24% of cases resulted in an acquittal or dismissal, and an average of 16% of cases were amended.
- Between 2003 and 2007, an average of 45% of Part I offense cases in District Court resulted in conviction and an average of 30% of cases resulted in an acquittal or dismissal.
- In Circuit Court, each year from 2003 to 2007, prison was the most common sentence for all Part I offenses. In 2007, 60% of cases resulted in a sentence of prison, 26% state probation, and 13% jail.
- In District Court, each year from 2003 to 2007, jail was the most common sentence for all Part I offenses. In 2007, 91% of cases resulted in a sentence of jail, 6% other, and 3% local probation.





Section VII: Trial Court Caseload Trends

In this section, Circuit and District Court case data from the Administrative Office of the Courts and data from the Department of Public Advocacy are presented.

- The number of cases disposed in Circuit Court varies greatly by circuit. In 2007, the number of cases disposed ranged from a high of 4,662 in the 30th Judicial Circuit (Jefferson County) to a low of 158 in the 36th Judicial Circuit (Knott and Magoffin Counties).
- With a 68% increase between 2004 and 2007, the 5th Judicial Circuit (Crittenden, Union, and Webster Counties) had the largest percent increase in cases disposed in Circuit Court.
- With a 54% decrease between 2004 and 2007, the 57th Judicial Circuit (Russell and Wayne Counties) had the largest percent decrease in cases disposed in Circuit Court.
- The number of cases disposed in District Court varies greatly by district. In 2007, the number of cases disposed ranged from a high of 137,680 in the 30th Judicial District (Jefferson County) to a low of 2,040 in the 59th Judicial District (Ballard and Carlisle Counties).
- With a 33% increase between 2004 and 2007, the 19th Judicial District (Bracken, Fleming, and Mason Counties) had the largest percent increase in cases disposed in District Court.
- With a 37% decrease between 2004 and 2007, the 58th Judicial District (Marshall County) had the largest percent decrease in cases disposed in District Court.
- Statewide, the number of appeals disposed in Circuit Court decreased each year between 2004 and 2007. After decreasing each year between 2004 and 2006, the number of felony cases disposed in Circuit Court increased slightly in 2007.
- Statewide, the number of criminal cases disposed in District Court remained relatively stable between 2004 and 2007, with the exception of domestic violence cases which decreased 38% between 2004 and 2007.
- In 2007, 96% (137,874 cases) of the Department of Public Advocacy's caseload was handled by the Trial Division. Of these cases, 78% were heard in District Court.
- The workload of the Department of Public Advocacy Field Offices has increased 30% from FY 2003 (112,610 cases) to FY 2007 (146,082 cases).








**Figure 7.c: Department of Public Advocacy Trial Division:

Section VIII: Appellate Court Caseload Trends

This section presents information from Kentucky's Appellate and Supreme Courts.

- Over the past five years, the Court of Appeals' total number of filings, dispositions, and opinions has remained relatively stable.
- From 2003 to 2007, the number of published opinions by the Court of Appeals has increased significantly, rising from 135 published opinions in 2003 to 299 published opinions in 2007.
- From 2003 to 2007, over 50% of the cases disposed in the Court of Appeals have consistently been civil appeals.
- The number of cases disposed in the Supreme Court increased each year from 2003 to 2005 and decreased in both 2006 and 2007. Between 2003 and 2007, the total number of disposed cases fell 20%.
- In 2007, over 90% of cases disposed in the Supreme Court were either motions for discretionary review or direct appeals/original actions.



Section IX: Commitment and Release Trends

This section presents information from the Department of Corrections (DOC) on prison admissions, commitments, sentences, and releases for Part I offenses, and from the Parole Board on hearings, paroles, deferrals, and serve-outs.

- During the five year period from 2003 to 2007, the number of prisoners admitted decreased from a high of 4,573 in 2003 to a low of 2,880 in 2007.
- In 2007, 91% of prison admissions were returned parole violators.
- The prison population in 2007 was 92% male and 8% female.
- The number of female prisoners increased 57% from 2003 to 2007.
- In 2007, the prison population was 67% white, 32% black, 1% Hispanic, and 0.4% other.
- Prisoners are fairly evenly distributed in terms of age. There are more prisoners in the age group of 26 to 30 (19%) than in any other age group. Only 1% of prisoners are under 21 years of age.
- Between 2006 and 2007, the number of new commitments for all Part I offenses remained relatively stable.
- The offenses with the largest percent decrease in new commitments between 2006 and 2007 were burglary (decreased 32%) and murder (decreased 27%). The offenses with the largest percent increase in new commitments between 2006 and 2007 were rape (increased 61%) and larceny/theft (increased 26%).
- The percentage of inmates deferred increased between 2003 and 2007. The percentage of inmates serving out their sentence increased between 2003 and 2004, decreased in 2005 and 2006, and increased again in 2007.


















Figure 9.h: Arson: Commitments and Releases, 2003-2007


Figure 9.i: Percent of Inmates Paroled, Deferred, and Served Out, 2003-2007

Section X: Juvenile Justice System Trends

This section presents information on juvenile offenders served by the juvenile justice system. Data are presented from the Kentucky State Police, Department of Juvenile Justice, and the Administrative Office of the Courts Court Designated Worker Program. It is important to note that the information from the Department of Juvenile Justice reflects the number of adjudicated youth served (not placed) by the Department. These youth may have been served in more than one program type during this period.

- Between 2006 and 2007, the juvenile arrest rate declined for all Part I offenses with the exception of rape (increased 28.4%) and larceny/theft (increased 11.4%). Overall, the juvenile arrest rate for all Part I offenses declined 1.4%.
- In 2007, compared to national juvenile arrest rates for Part I offenses, Kentucky's juvenile arrest rates were lower for murder, aggravated assault, robbery, larceny/theft, auto theft, and arson but higher for rape and burglary.
- For all Part I offenses combined, Kentucky's juvenile arrest rate was just 6.6% lower than the national juvenile arrest rate in 2007.
- In 2007, the total number of committed and probated juveniles was 1,268. The majority of these juveniles (79%) were charged with either burglary or larceny-theft.
- In 2007, the average length of stay for juveniles adjudicated for aggravated assault (218 days) was higher than the average length of stay for any other Part I offense. The shortest average length of stay was for juveniles adjudicated for arson (126 days).
- After remaining relatively stable between 2003 and 2005, the total number of youth served by the juvenile justice system increased to 2,977 in 2006, and then decreased in 2007 to 2,267.
- More youth served by the juvenile justice system were placed in the home under the supervision of a parent or guardian between 2003 and 2007 than in any other type of placement.




Figure 10.a: Average Length of Stay for Juveniles by Part I Offense, 2007















Court Designated Worker Program

In 1986, the Kentucky General Assembly enacted legislation to provide a statewide Court Designated Worker (CDW) program under the direction of the Department of Juvenile Services of the Administrative Office of the Courts, the administrative arm of the Kentucky Court of Justice. The mission of the CDW program is to reduce delinquency among Kentucky's youth through a collaboration of statewide pre-court services and programs that promote education and accountability. CDWs process juvenile complaints against individuals under the age of 18. The complaints are known as public offenses or status offenses. Public offenses are the same as adult crimes. Status offenses are noncriminal forms of juvenile behavior, such as running away from home, skipping class, tobacco offenses or exhibiting beyond-control behaviors at home or at school.

Each of Kentucky's 120 counties has access to the services of a CDW who is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. A set of uniform criteria determine which juvenile complaints must be forwarded to formal court and which are eligible for informal processing through the CDW program. More serious offenses and repeat offenders are referred to formal court. Juveniles involved in minor offenses are generally eligible for informal processing and enter diversion agreements. A diversion agreement is a voluntary contract between the CDW and the juvenile to resolve a complaint. The data included in this section were provided by the Administrative Office of the Courts.

- In 2007, Jefferson County had the highest number of complaints processed by the CDW program (7,582) and Edmonson County had the lowest (18).
- The majority of complaints processed by the CDW program involved juveniles charged with assault, theft, or burglary.
- In 2007, 27% of complaints filed with the CDW program resulted in a successful diversion.

Section XI: Selected Crime Categories and Crime Indicators

In addition to reviewing criminal justice system data pertaining to Part I offenses, data on selected categories of crime have been included for informational purposes. These categories include drug related offenses with a particular focus on methamphetamines and prescription drugs, driving under the influence (DUI) offenses, sex offenses, and school safety. Information presented in this section includes Kentucky State Police arrest data, Federal Bureau of Investigation Uniform Crime Report arrest and offense statistics, conviction and disposition information provided by the Administrative Office of the Courts, information on commitments provided by the Department of Corrections, data from the Cabinet for Health and Family Services' Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER) system, and finally data from the Kentucky Center for School Safety.



Drug Related Offenses

- The total number of arrests for drug offenses increased 29.8% between 2005 and 2007.
- Between 2005 and 2007, the most significant increase in the number of drug arrests involved arrests for “Other Dangerous Non-Narcotic Drugs” (38.1%).
- The arrest rate for drug offenses varies significantly across jurisdictions. In 2007, there were no drug arrests in Robertson County. The highest rate of drug arrests was in Todd County, which had 34.1 arrests per 1,000 persons.



Methamphetamine Related Offenses

In 2007, Kentucky became the second state to implement a real-time statewide electronic monitoring system capable of blocking the sale of pseudoephedrine (PSE) products to individuals in violation of purchasing more than 9 grams in 30 days (KRS 218A.1446). The program, MethCheck, also provides 24/7 access to law enforcement officers conducting investigations on individuals suspected of violations of PSE restrictions. In the first 7 months of operation the system blocked over 10,000 attempts to violate PSE restrictions resulting in over 30,000 grams of PSE kept out of the hands of potential meth cooks. MethCheck is a partnership between the Office of Inspector General Professional Standards Branch, the Cabinet for Health and Family Services, and the Kentucky Office of Drug Control Policy.

To illustrate the prevalence of methamphetamine manufacturing, trafficking, and abuse in the Commonwealth, this section presents data from the Kentucky State Police, the Administrative Office of the Courts, and the Department of Corrections.

- The greatest percentage of methamphetamine related offenses and arrests were associated with manufacturing.
- The total number of methamphetamine arrests decreased significantly between 2006 and 2007, falling from 1,223 arrests in 2006 to 690 arrests in 2007.
- After reaching a high of 5,872 cases in 2005, the total number of cases involving methamphetamine offenses decreased to 4,100 in 2006 and then decreased again to 3,795 in 2007.
- After the total number of methamphetamine cases in juvenile court decreased each year from 2003 to 2006, the total number increased in 2007.
- In 2007, 29% of methamphetamine cases resulted in a conviction and 19% resulted in an acquittal or dismissal.
- After increasing each year between 2003 and 2005, the number of new commitments to the Department of Corrections for methamphetamine offenses fell in 2006 to 298 but then rose to 329 in 2007.








Figure 11.c: Total Methamphetamine Cases, 2003-2007


Figure 11.d: Percent of Methamphetamine Cases Resulting in Conviction or Acquittal/Dismissal, 2003-2007

Prescription Drug Related Offenses

Misuse, abuse and illegal sale of prescription drugs are some of the largest threats to patient safety in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. These problems have reached epidemic proportions, with more and more incidents of “doctor shopping” being uncovered, and the street values of “legal” drugs reaching all-time highs.

The Kentucky All Schedule Prescription Electronic Reporting (KASPER) system catalogs most of the schedule II-V controlled substance prescriptions written and dispensed within the state, and provides a tool for practitioners, pharmacists and law enforcement to improve patient safety and fight the abuse and diversion of controlled substance prescription drugs. KASPER is Kentucky’s Prescription Monitoring Program (PMP). PMPs vary in their characteristics, but they all have a common goal of reducing prescription drug abuse and diversion. KASPER is one of the most comprehensive Prescription Monitoring Programs (PMPs) in the country. In February 2006, President Bush released a national drug control strategy that hails KASPER as one of the nation’s flagship PMPs.

Responsibility for KASPER resides in the Cabinet for Health and Family Services, Office of the Inspector General, with maintenance and enhancements to the system provided by the Cabinet’s Office of Information Technology. Kentucky statutes require dispensers of controlled substances to report the prescriptions dispensed once within every eight days. These data are received by a data collection agent that then has an additional eight days to edit and process the data and provide the data to the Cabinet, where the data is loaded into the KASPER system. The data are then available to authorized users of the system, who may be prescribers for medical treatment of a patient, dispensers for pharmaceutical treatment of a patient, law enforcement officers for an active drug related investigation, licensing boards for a licensee, the Kentucky Medicaid program for a recipient, a grand jury (by subpoena), and a judge or probation or parole office administering a drug diversion or probation program.

A KASPER report shows all controlled substance prescriptions a patient has had for a specified time period, as well as the doctor who prescribed them and the dispenser who dispensed them. Kentucky Revised Statute 218A.240 provides that the Cabinet shall use the data for investigations, research, statistical analysis and educational purposes, and shall proactively identify trends in controlled substance usage and other potential problem areas.

This section includes data on prescription drug activity in the Commonwealth as collected by the Kentucky State Police, Administrative Office of the Courts, and KASPER.

- The greatest percentage of prescription drug related offenses and arrests were related to possession.
- In 2007, 36% of prescription drug related cases resulted in a conviction. The percent of prescription drug related cases resulting in conviction has remained relatively stable over the five year period between 2003 and 2007.
- In 2007, the number of prescription drug related cases reached a five-year high of 7,136 cases. The total number of prescription drug related cases increased 22% between 2003 and 2007.
- In 2007, Owsley County had the highest rate of prescriptions dispensed for all controlled substances (4744.2 prescriptions dispensed per 1,000 population). Russell County had the lowest rate (1015.9 prescriptions dispensed per 1,000 population).
- Of the 120 counties in Kentucky, 118 counties saw an increase in the rate of prescriptions dispensed for all controlled substances between 2005 and 2007.






Figure 11.f: Total Prescription Drug Cases, 2003-2007

Figure 11.g: Percent of Prescription Drug Cases Resulting in Conviction or Acquittal/Dismissal, 2003-2007



Driving Under the Influence (DUI) Offenses

- In 2007, Carroll, Gallatin, and Fulton Counties had the highest DUI arrest rates in the state, all with over 20.0 arrests per 1,000 population.
- In 2007, Estill, Fleming, Hickman, and Scott Counties had the lowest DUI arrest rates in the state, all with less than 3.0 arrests per 1,000 population.
- The total number of adult DUI arrests increased each consecutive year between 2004 and 2007. The adult arrest rate increased 43% between 2003 and 2007 and the juvenile arrest rate fell 29% between 2003 and 2007.
- There was little variation in the distribution of DUI arrestees in terms of sex and race from 2003 through 2007.
- Between 2003 and 2007, the DUI caseload in Lee County almost doubled, making it the county with the largest percent increase over this five year period.
- With only 11 cases in 2007, Robertson County had the fewest DUI cases compared to any other county. Jefferson County had the most DUI cases with a total of 5,504 cases in 2007.
- In 2007, 68% of all DUI cases resulted in a conviction. However, when broken down by offense, the rate of conviction decreased with each subsequent DUI offense. For example, in 2007, 70% of individuals charged with their first DUI offense were convicted while just 22% of individuals charged their 4th DUI were convicted.














Figure 11.n: All DUI Offenses by Disposition, Statewide, 2003-2007



Sex Offenses

- The number of forcible rapes in Kentucky rose 6.7% between 2005 and 2007.
- The forcible rape rate in Kentucky was lower than the national rate in 2005 and 2006 but higher than the national rate in 2007.
- In 2007, Ohio and Tennessee had higher rates of forcible rape than Kentucky while Illinois, Indiana, Missouri, Virginia, and West Virginia had lower rates of forcible rape.
- The total number of rape, sodomy, and sexual abuse cases all declined between 2005 and 2007.
- Of all sex offense cases in both Circuit and District Courts, cases involving sexual abuse had the highest rate of conviction.
- In 2007, 73% of Circuit Court sex offense cases resulted in a sentence of prison, 12% state probation, and 11% jail.
- In 2007, 92% of District Court sex offense cases resulted in a sentence of jail, 3% state probation, 3% other, and 2% local probation.
- The total number of sex offenders newly committed to the Department of Corrections increased from 454 offenders in 2006 to 499 offenders in 2007.
- The number of sex offenders serving out their sentence more than doubled between 2004 and 2006 but then fell to a five year low of in 2007.
- The number of new commitments for rape, sodomy, and sexual abuse increased between 2006 and 2007.
- The number of new commitments for sexual abuse was higher than the number of new commitments for any other sex offense during the five year period from 2003 through 2007.




Figure 11.p: Forcible Rape, 2003-2007




Figure 11.q: Number of Sex Offense Cases, 2003-2007










School Safety

When House Bill 330 was passed in the 1998 General Assembly, an opportunity emerged for Kentucky to employ research driven strategies to maintain a safe and secure learning environment for all children. The Kentucky Center for School Safety (KCSS) was established to provide data analysis, research, and technical assistance, and to disseminate information on successful strategies to ensure school safety. KCSS is a collaborative partnership between a contract agency, Eastern Kentucky University, and three partner agencies, the University of Kentucky, Murray State University, and the Kentucky School Boards Association. For the 2006-2007 school year, KCSS published its eighth annual report on school safety. The report confirmed that many of the efforts to reduce school crime had indeed been successful. The following is a summary of the findings as they pertain to law violations and consequences in Kentucky schools:

- Of Kentucky's total 2006-2007 public school population (637,457 students), 7.51% of students committed an offense that resulted in suspension, corporal punishment, or expulsion (with or without services).
- Despite the fact that disciplinary actions for both Part I law violations and Part II law violations increased between the 2005-2006 school year and 2006-2007 school year (16% and 11% respectively), the number of disciplinary actions for both Part I Law violations and Part II Law violations in the 2006-2007 school year still remains significantly lower than the number of disciplinary actions in the 2003-2004 school year.
- The total number of disciplinary actions for Part I law violations in the 2006-2007 school year decreased 49% from the number reported in the 2003-2004 school year.
- The total number of disciplinary actions for Part II law violations in the 2005-2006 school year decreased 6% from the number reported in the 2003-2004 school year.
- Compared to the 2005-2006 school year, the number of reported law violations increased for robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, and arson in the 2006-2007 school year. The number of larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft offenses decreased. There were no reported homicide or rape offenses during either school year.
- Drug abuse violations accounted for the largest number of Part II law violations during the last three school years.
- From the 2004-2005 school year to the 2006-2007 school year, weapon offenses involving a handgun rose 173%.
- Region 3, Jefferson County, had the highest rate of disciplinary actions for law violations with a rate of 1.57 disciplinary actions per 100 students. Region 2, Southwest, had the lowest rate with .35 disciplinary actions per 100 students.
- For Part I and II law violations, out of school suspensions increased 2% in the three year period between the 2004-2005 and 2006-2007 school years. During this same period, expulsion without services decreased 6% and expulsion with services decreased 15%.
- The total number of possession, use, and distribution violations fell each consecutive year between the 2004-2005 school year and the 2006-2007 school year. Although drug violations decreased for most types of substances between the 2004-2005 school year and the 2006-2007 school year, the number of possession and use violations for cocaine/crack and prescription drugs increased and the number of distribution violations for prescription drug violations increased.




Figure 11.w: Total Disciplinary Actions for Part I Violations, School Years 2003-2004, 2004-2005, 2005-2006, 2006-2007






Figure 11.y: Comparison of Disciplinary Actions for Part I and II Law Violations, School Years 2004-2005, 2005-2006, 2006-2007

Section XII: Key Criminal Justice Cost Information

While monitoring changes in crime trends, it is also important to track the range of costs associated with incarceration, community supervision, and criminal justice programs for adults and juveniles.

Since national research has indicated that community-based programs provide effective and cost-efficient alternatives to detention and incarceration for selected offenders, these factors should be routinely considered in the allocation of limited criminal justice resources and the development of statewide criminal justice policy.

It is also important to note that while meta-analysis of research studies provide support for the position that treatment works and that punishment is ineffective or counter-effective unless combined with training and reinforcement for positive skills and behaviors, it is also clear that one size does not fit all and programs must be matched to the needs and abilities of the offender.

This section includes data on state criminal justice budgets, police employment trends, incarceration costs, and grant funding.

- In FY 2007, Kentucky's criminal justice agencies' enacted budgets totaled \$1,061,764,100.00.
- The cost per inmate per day in Kentucky's correctional institutions varies by level of security, from \$35.30 (Marion Adjustment Center) to \$72.82 (Kentucky State Reformatory). The total institutional average is \$50.99 per day.
- According to the Department of Juvenile Justice, in FY 2007, the total annual costs for juvenile institutions, including detention centers, youth development centers, and group homes, was \$55,983,334.00.
- In FY 2007, the Department of Corrections spent \$54,747,066.88 on medical expenditures up from \$43,523,782.38 spent on medical expenditures in FY 2006.



Grants Management

KRS 15A.150 authorizes the Grants Management Branch, Justice and Public Safety Cabinet, to receive and award federal funds obtained from the U.S. Department of Justice. Federal funds are awarded to state agencies, local units of government, and private, nonprofit organizations based on three broad types of grants: Formula, Block, and Discretionary. Formula grants are based on specific criteria determined by the granting agency (e.g., the Edward Byrne Memorial Grant Program awards money based on a state's population and criminal justice expenditures). Block grants are federal allocations provided to states for a specific purpose, with relatively broad guidelines for allocation. Discretionary grants are those used for special purposes (e.g., funding of the Statistical Analysis Center). Among the major grant programs administered by the Grants Management Branch are the following:

- **Edward Byrne Memorial State and Local Law Enforcement Assistance Block Grants (LLEBG)**
The Byrne program is a federal formula grant program which awards monies to states based on a formula consisting of a base amount of .25 percent of the total allocation plus Kentucky's relative share based on population. Funds are available from 28 program areas and are used to create safer communities and improved criminal justice systems. State and local criminal justice system agencies are eligible to apply. The Byrne and LLEBG grant programs were replaced by Justice Assistance Grants in 2005; limited residual Byrne grant funds remain for award.
- **Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grants (JAG)**
Funds are awarded to the Commonwealth and certain qualifying local jurisdictions based on population and the number of Uniform Crime Report (UCR) Part I violent crimes reported to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). These federal funds may be used to provide funding to state agencies and local units of government, and private not-for-profit organizations, for the implementation of law enforcement programs; prosecution and court programs; prevention and education programs; corrections and community corrections programs; drug treatment programs; victims services; and planning, evaluation, and technology improvement programs. The JAG program replaced Byrne and LLEBG grants in 2005.
- **Law Enforcement Service Fee Fund (LSF)**
This program is fully funded by the Commonwealth of Kentucky, with revenue derived from a fee assessed on persons convicted of driving under the influence. Funds are used for DUI related purposes (e.g., blood alcohol testing and equipment, DUI education).
- **Victims of Crime Act (VOCA)**
VOCA is a federal formula grant program allocated according to population. Funds are provided to units of local government and non-profits to provide direct services to crime victims. Funds are typically used to support victim advocate positions. Any private, nonprofit agency providing direct services to victims of crime is eligible.
- **Violence Against Women Act (VAWA)**
VAWA is a federal formula grant program allocated according to population. Funds are generally provided for victim advocacy/services (30%), prosecution (25%), law enforcement (25%), discretionary (15%), and courts (5%). Eligible agencies/entities include victim service programs, law enforcement, prosecutors, and any program providing services to adult victims of domestic violence and sexual assault.

The remainder of this section presents information on grant awards by county, and includes data on the Alternatives to Incarceration grant program administered by the Kentucky Corrections Commission. For brief program descriptions of additional grants administered by the Grants Management Branch, see Appendix C.



Appendix A: Description of Existing Criminal Justice Information Systems

CourtNet

Allows easy and expeditious access to criminal and civil cases filed with the Kentucky Court System. Provides court case tracking, consolidates local court information systems (including KY Courts), and serves as the system for accessing statistical data.

eWarrants

Web-based application that provides law enforcement real-time access to arrest warrant information. The system provides a mechanism to create paperless complaints that flow to the judge for review and signature into a warrant then to law enforcement for servicing. Project is currently in pilot with a planned state roll-out for late 2007.

JusticeXchange

Web portal that provides law enforcement and other criminal justice officials instant access to information about offenders held in jails throughout the state and across the country. Based on data collected automatically from local jail management systems, JusticeXchange provides near real-time current and historical information about incarcerated offenders, including biographical information, charges, photographs, and behavioral reports, all accessible through a secure website. Vendor: Apriss.

Juvenile Offender Records Information (JORI)

Case management system that tracks juvenile offenders through the criminal justice system. Includes offenders' demographic information, charges, work history, education, and treatment. JORI is a Visual Studio .NET application.

Kentucky Offender Management System (KOMS)

Kentucky Offender Management System is a Web-Enabled Integrated Offender Management tool which has replaced outdated individual software applications that were used for managing, processing and tracking Kentucky DOC inmates and Probation & Parole clients. The objectives of KOMS are as follows:

- Maintain a repository of information that applies to all offenders regardless of their current status, such as demographics and criminal history.
- Maintain a repository of information unique to offenders who are under supervision because they are serving probation, parole, etc. Examples of this type of information are supervision fees owed and paid, supervision contacts, and risk/needs assessments.
- Maintain a repository of information unique to offenders who are incarcerated, such as housing, classification, custody level and job assignments.
- Calculate and maintain sentence calculations for all KY offenders regardless of their status.
- Maintain a repository of information about facilities, staff, outside organizations, and persons within those organizations that deal with offenders, regardless of their status.
- Store this repository of information in a relational database that is shared across all this functionality.
- Provide access to this database through a web browser, such as Microsoft Internet Explorer®, using a tree-type menu that expands and contracts.



- Make the update of this data simple, intuitive, reliable, and secure.
- Provide many non-updateable views of this data for everyday use by anyone who is authorized to access this system via a secure sign on.
- Produce operational and management reports and statistics needed by the users.

Kentucky State Police

Core systems described utilize various vendor proprietary technology, in addition to SQL, ORACLE, VB, and FILENET.

- **Automated Fingerprint Identification System (AFIS)**
Statewide system of Livescan devices in each county detention center, state prison facilities, juvenile detention centers and commercial drivers license-HazMat testing sites, tied into centralized AFIS system. Provides for the capture, storage, and search of fingerprint information, and transmission to FBI-IAFIS system. Vendor: Motorola.
- **Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD)**
Utilized by 17 KSP Posts/HQ Dispatch Centers to provide call tracking, emergency medical dispatch, call response, etc., in addition to providing required GIS mapping of land line and mobile callers. Vendor: Interact.
- **Computerized Criminal History System (CCH)**
State criminal history repository for fingerprint supported arrests and supporting participation in Triple I. Includes utilization of XML rapsheet. Vendor: SAIC.
- **Kentucky's Open Portal Solution (KYOPS)**
Serves as the statewide law enforcement system for the electronic/hard copy capture, quality control, transmission, storage and retrieval of the following law enforcement report types: traffic collision, crime, uniform citation, courtesy warning, call response, and field information reports which are fed directly to the state's Intelligence Fusion Center. Features of the electronic reporting component include real time submission of reports, GPS coordinates collection, both integrated crime scene and collision investigation diagramming software and all modules support the utilization of 2D bar code scanners for importing drivers license data. The system also features a statewide Master Name Index and Master Location Index, utilizing all mentioned data sources. Access to submitted records is provided through a secure web portal, with various "canned" reports available for statistical analysis of crime and collision data, as well as the ability to do custom inquiries across the various data sources for crime/collision analysis, planning and resource allocation. Historical Crime mapping and Collision mapping are also accessible through the web portal. Vendor: IDMS.
- **KyWINS Messenger**
Open source Instant Messaging solution customized for usage by public safety personnel operating on wireless mobile data system. Provides uniform data/IM interoperability to public safety personnel, across boundaries, agencies and disciplines, free of charge. Also allows communication back to PC based personnel in traditional wired settings. Currently being piloted with 100+ users in 4-5 different counties, from police officers to fire/EMS personnel to the state Office of Homeland Security. Expected roll out statewide in 2007. Vendor: Jabber-Jive Software.
- **Law Enforcement Information Network of Kentucky (LINK)**
Serves as the primary law enforcement communications network providing access to NCIC and NLETS. Also houses all state "hot" files, to include EPO/DVO, wanted, missing persons, sex offenders, etc. Vendor: CPI.
- **Mobile Data Computer System (MDCS)**
Statewide system which encompasses over 125 tower sites and base stations all networked to three integrated Internet Protocol Network Controllers, providing seamless Mobile Data access to all law enforcement agencies in the state, with no ongoing monthly charge for airtime usage. This access allows agencies to access both state level (LINK) and federal (NCI) data from their cars, in addition to providing silent dispatch, AVL other features, and instant messaging, depending upon the software utilized by the agency.



Agencies utilizing the state standard mobile client software, BIO-key, may utilize the state provided shared mobile message switch, thereby eliminating the need to purchase their own, and giving them access to all agencies/users, utilizing the same platform. Vendor: IP MobileNet & BIO-key.

- **Sex Offender Registry (SOR)**

Serves as the state repository of registered sex offender information, including public access website, listing all registered offenders. Linked to the National Public Sex Offender registry system. Vendor: CPI.

KY Courts

County specific stand-alone electronic case management system that tracks all information related to court cases.

Victim Information and Network Everyday (VINE)

The automated notification system that alerts victims about a change in the custody status of their offender. Internet browser front end, SQL server database. Vendor: Appriss.



Appendix B: Part I and Part II Offenses

Part I Offenses

Murder: Murder/homicide is the willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another or the killing of another person through gross negligence. Deaths caused by negligence, attempts to kill, assaults to kill, suicides, and accidental deaths and deaths of persons due to their own negligence, accidental deaths not resulting from gross negligence, and traffic fatalities are excluded.

Rape: Rape is defined as the carnal knowledge of a person, forcible or otherwise, against the person's will. Rapes by force and attempts to rape, regardless of the age of the victim, are included. Excluded are rapes where the victim is under the age of consent and no force is used.

Robbery: Robbery is the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Aggravated Assault: Assault is the unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. All assault attempts where serious injury would have been likely to occur are included. Assaults which do not include the use of a dangerous weapon and in which there was no serious or aggravated injury are excluded. These simple assaults are counted as Part II crimes.

Burglary: Burglary is unlawful entering or remaining in a building with the intent to commit a crime. This includes entries where force of any kind is used to gain entrance, entries where no force was used (an unlocked door or by concealment), and attempts to enter forcibly (even though entry was not actually gained).

Larceny-theft: Larceny-theft is the unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Examples are thefts of bicycles, motor vehicle parts and accessories, shoplifting, pocket-picking, or the stealing of any property or article that is not taken by force and violence or by fraud. Attempted larcenies are included. Embezzlement, confidence games, forgery, check fraud, etc., are excluded.

Auto Theft: Auto theft includes all thefts and attempted thefts of motor vehicles. Motorboats, construction equipment, airplanes, and farming equipment are specifically excluded from this category.

Arson: Arson includes any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a residence, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc. Only fires determined to have been willfully or maliciously set are classified as arson.



Part II Offenses

Part II Offenses consist of all other offenses, with the exception of traffic violations. They generally include the following:

- Manslaughter by Negligence
- Other Assaults
- Arson
- Forgery and Counterfeiting
- Fraud
- Embezzlement
- Stolen Property: Buying, Receiving, Possession
- Vandalism
- Weapons: Carrying, Possession
- Prostitution and Commercialized Vice
- Sex Offenses
- Narcotic Drug Laws
- Gambling
- Offenses Against Family
- Driving Under the Influence
- Liquor Laws
- Drunkenness
- Disorderly Conduct
- All Other Offenses (except traffic)
- Curfew and Loitering Laws
- Runaways



Appendix C: Additional Grant Program Descriptions

Bulletproof Vest Partnership Grant Program

This federal program assists states and local units of government in equipping their law enforcement officers with armored vests. A match of 50% is required, and the Chief Executive Officer of each jurisdiction must coordinate the vest needs among all its law enforcement agencies.

National Criminal History Improvement Program

State agencies designated by the Governor (in this case, the Kentucky Justice and Public Safety Cabinet), can apply for funding to enhance criminal history records. Allowable uses include costs associated with database automation, interfacing with the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS), equipment, training, and research. A 20% match is required.

Residential Substance Abuse Treatment Program

This program is designed to assist states and local governments in developing and implementing residential substance abuse treatment programs in correctional facilities. A 25% match is required. The program also requires urinalysis or other drug testing of participating prisoners, separation from the general correctional population, and is required to last between six and twelve months.

State Justice Statistics Program for Statistical Analysis Centers (SACs)

State agencies authorized with responsibility for the state's Statistical Analysis Center can apply. In Kentucky, the SAC is a component of the Justice and Public Safety Cabinet. No match is required. Funds can be used for the establishment and operation of a SAC.

Paul Coverdell Forensic Science Improvement Grant Program

Coverdell funds are available to state and local governments to improve the quality and timeliness of forensic science and medical examiner services and/or to eliminate backlogs in the analysis of forensic evidence, including controlled substances firearms examination, forensic pathology, latent prints, questioned documents, toxicology, and trace evidence.
