In addition, funds will be for contractual services with Marquis Software to assist in improving the efficiency of the check-in requirement of paroled inmates with their probation officers which in return will help reduce recidivism while protecting the health and safety of those individuals.
Kentucky Department of Parks	\$139,735	PPE, cleaning supplies, replacement of ranger gear, reimbursement of overtime expenses related to COVID-19 response, along with training to prepare for and prevent the spread of COVID-19.
Kentucky Department of Public Advocacy	\$55,890	PPE and technology software in order to video conference with their clients and virtually participate in court hearings and trials as necessary.
